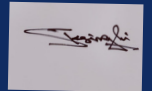

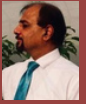
Public Safety and Security: Ensuring public safety and security is an ongoing challenge. Laws related to public safety need to adapt to new technologies, such as those related to national security or public health.
